Powderhorn Lake wins second annual Facebook poll _[_ (aka, Minne the Lake Creature) launches Wednesday, June 4, about 10:30AM

Minneapolis, Minn. – The Mona Lisa of Minneapolis lakes will grace Powderhorn Park this summer, beginning Wednesday, June 4. Fans of _[_ (aka, Minne the Lake the Creature) and friends of the Minneapolis Parks Foundation chose the South Minneapolis location by participating in a two-week poll on the Foundation's Facebook page.

This is the second year that the Parks Foundation has asked Minne fans to choose her summer home. Last year, she graced the lagoon at Lake Nokomis. In 2014, nine lakes were candidates for Minne's throne: Brownie, Calhoun, Cedar, Hiawatha, Isles, Nokomis, Powderhorn and Wirth.

Minne fans voted by "liking" the photo of their favorate lake. Powderhorn received 30% of the 1,200 votes – or 347 likes. Hiawatha came in a close second at 337 likes. The poll ran for two weeks, ending on Friday, May 30, at about 10:30pm.

Minne the Lake Creature was first introduced in 2009 and has graced all nine of the 17 Minneapolis lakes she can, sometimes moving three times per summer. Since 2012, Minne has made one lake her home. Minneapolis Park & Recreation Board regulations regarding invasive species require a two-week holding period when moving Minne from one week to another.
