

Cool Connections

With Minneapolis Parks Foundation support, the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board secured an historic easement along the riverfront that will make it possible to connect North Minneapolis through a new 1,000-foot trail link. When it's complete in late 2024, the trail will connect the Great Northern Greenway Overlook to the downtown riverfront and the 51-mile Grand Rounds National Scenic Byway, which runs through most of Minneapolis as a continuous dedicated bike trail and walking path.



Big Ideas for Even Better Parks

Our popular Next Generation of Parks Event Series returned to form in 2023, with presentations from thought leaders exploring

the intersection of public design, social justice, and community health. This past year, renowned landscape architect Mikyoung Kim shared how parks and play can restore our post-pandemic world; Latino Outdoors founder José González explored how nature can heal severed communities; and MPRB Superintendent Al Bangoura reflected on the state of our parks as the Minneapolis parks system celebrated its 140th anniversary.





A New Riverview

Apprentices from Juxtaposition Arts' Environmental Design Studio found a fresh new platform for telling community stories, tying hundreds of recycled plastic conduits into the chain link fence at CenterPoint Energy's 26th Avenue facility. Spelling out the word "Riverview," the installation reflects on the site's past as the Riverview Supper Club, a storied North Minneapolis nightclub, while inviting viewers to see the Mississippi in a new way as more of the city's riverfront is reimagined as and transformed to park land.



Posters for Parks Show

The Posters for Parks event in October was another recordsetter, with more than 885 participants who took home more than 970 limited edition original posters created by 44 local artists. With proceeds split 50-50 between artists and the Minneapolis Parks Foundation's People for Parks Fund, the festive annual pop-up party has become a favorite for arts and parks lovers alike.

Redefining a Rec Center

In 2023, the Harrison Recreation Center was transformed into a creative-technology makerspace, equipped with everything from audio mixers and 3D printers to video production equipment and art supplies. This Spark'd Studio was made possible with help from the Best Buy Foundation.



Power to the Parks

From fresh veggie gardens and free sailing days on Bde Maka Ska, to bilingual fishing clinics and pickleball for all, the projects supported by the People for Parks Fund are all about removing barriers and encouraging people from all walks of life to see themselves in the parks. With your support in 2023, the People for Parks Fund awarded more than \$57,000 to 11 different programs, including free swimming lessons, and kayaking experiences for BIPOC communities.

The Case for North Commons

"When that bell goes off they come streaming in," says Se'Anna Johnson, the Youth Specialist at North Commons Park. Everyday about 100 kids walk over from school

to play ball, do homework, horse around, and grab snacks provided in partnership with Minneapolis Public Schools. "For a lot of these kids, they're here from three to nine nearly every day. We're their home away from home."






What happens during those hours between school and home can make a critical difference in the physical, mental, and emotional health of kids. That's why healthy youth development has emerged as one of the goals the whole community shares when it comes to transforming North Commons Park for the next generation.

"The opportunity to make a real difference in the overall community health of North Minneapolis, especially for young people who depend on the park, has been a really compelling part of this project," Minneapolis Parks Foundation's project manager Shawn Lewis says about the years of community engagement that contributed to the \$35 million renovation/expansion plan. "We know there are some serious health disparities for people in North Minneapolis, and we believe that a healthy, thriving park with responsive programming is one of the tools we can use to close those gaps."

Life expectancy for the residents of North Minneapolis is lower than the city-wide average, while the rates of childhood obesity and asthma hospitalizations are two to five times more common. But Dr. Kevin Gilliam, primary care physician and medical director of NorthPoint Health and Wellness Center, says parks can be part of the prescription for better health.



active generally," says Gilliam, who also serves on an advisory committee of local nonprofits and businesses looking at ways to leverage North Commons Park and its programs to provide more opportunities for youth development and community connections. "Any kind of work I can do to encourage people to engage more in natural spaces, the better."

While improved park spaces can get the public moving more, new community gathering spaces planned for North Commons can also host inspiring wellness programs, like the series Johnson recently offered at the rec center with presentations on food and mood, yoga, food and mindfulness, and v-step, a hip-hop-centered aerobics class. "It's good to remind people that you really don't need to pay to get a good workout," she says. "Just take a minute to dance a little bit, step it out, and you're going to feel better."

Making More Possible

When it comes to deciding what to do with her charitable donations, Martha Gabbert looks for ways to make as much impact as possible. "My strategy for giving is to look for organizations whose objectives align with mine, and that have the organizational capacity to translate my gift to much larger gifts from people with greater capacity," she says. "That's why supporting the campaign for North Commons Park seemed so right to me."

A former board member for the Minneapolis Parks Foundation, and a long-time parks lover, Gabbert was eager to lend her support to the renovation of North Commons, making the very first gift to the \$20 million capital campaign after taking a tour of the current facilities with Minneapolis Parks Foundation staff members. "Parks matter to me, especially those that serve underserved communities," she says. "But I also admire the inclusive process the Minneapolis Parks Foundation has taken in working with the community to support what North Minneapolis neighbors want to see in their parks. That kind of process takes time, but I believe it will make for a better outcome."



Gabbert's early gift of \$500,000 helped the Minneapolis Parks Foundation gather momentum during the guiet phase of the campaign, helping to leverage a challenge grant from the Richard M. Schulze Family Foundation and leadership donations from the Carlson Family Foundation, the Margaret A. Cargill Fund at the Saint Paul and Minnesota Foundation, WEM, and Al and Kathy Lenzmeier. "From the start, Martha has been eager to support the North Minneapolis community through this project, and she saw clearly how her own generosity could generate interest and excitement from others," says Jennifer Downham, Minneapolis Parks Foundation's Chief Development Officer. "Thanks to that early support, we're halfway to our funding goal, and we're in a much stronger position to make our case to the wider community."
